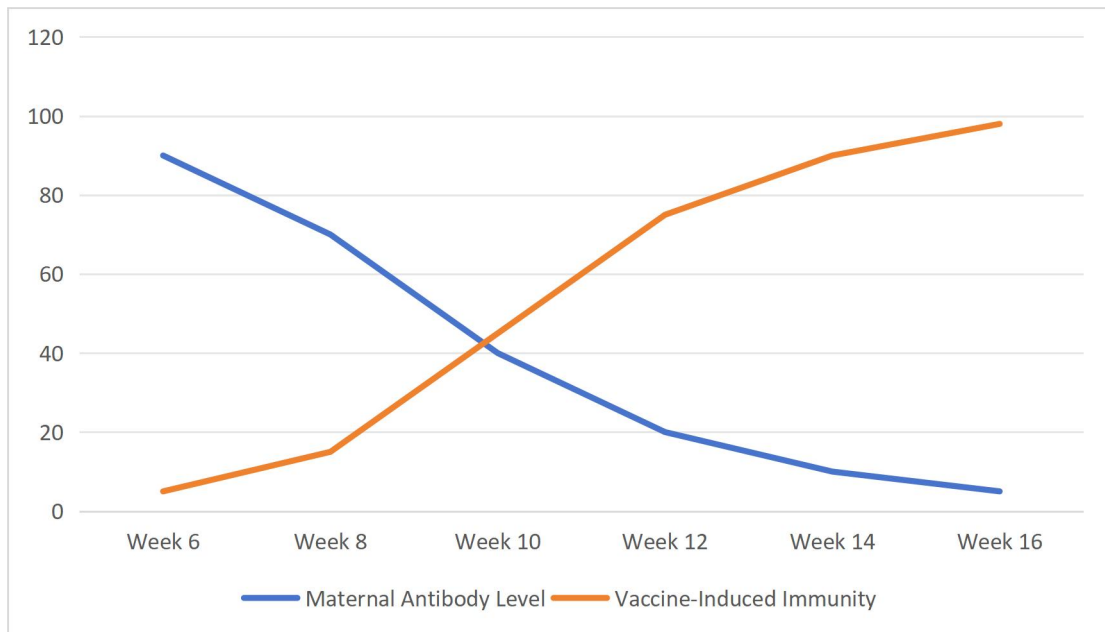
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Paperwork	Forgotten at home	Breeder records & adoption papers ready

1. The Essential Survival Kit

To make your first puppy vet visit seamless, you need more than just a leash. Veterinarians require specific data to assess your pet’s risk profile.

- Medical Records: Any previous vaccinations or deworming history from the breeder.
- A Fecal Sample: Essential for checking intestinal parasites (common in puppies).
- High-Value Treats: Small pieces of boiled chicken or specialized snacks (Avoid any toxic dog foods during training).

2. The Physical Examination

During the first puppy vet visit, the vet will perform a “nose-to-tail” check. This is the perfect time to ask about nutrition, such as the benefits of [Omega-3 fatty acids for puppies](#).

Pro-Tip: Fear-Free Handling

Request a “happy visit” where the vet simply gives treats without needles. This prevents

long-term [behavioral issues in dogs](#) related to clinical visits.



3. Post-Visit Care & Observation

After the visit, your puppy may be sleepy. This is normal. However, watch for severe allergic reactions like facial swelling or hives. If you notice any drastic [changes in your puppy's personality](#), contact your vet immediately.
